Rosemary Kudnarto Wanganeen

Rosemary is a proud Aboriginal Kaurna & Wirrungu woman of SA. Compelled to intuitively commit herself to a deep grieving, healing process she emerged to become the founding CEO of the Sacred Site Within Healing Centre (1993) & the Australian Institute for Loss & Grief (2005). Consequently, her 'industry experience' has resulted in her being accepted into a MPhil at University of Adelaide (2018).

Lee Witczak

Recipient of the Brain Injury Network SA Individual Achievement Award 2018, Lee Witczak is founding member and chair of Sit Down Shutup and Watch (SDSW), a steering committee of creative leaders who identify as having learning disability. In 2014, supported by Tutti Arts Inc, SDSW launched the Southern Hemisphere's inaugural Learning Disability Led Film & New Media Festival. No longer just a festival, activities now include touring and outreach; with a focus firmly on Regional SA and utilising an authentic person-centred approach, SDSW inspire achievement and build capacity through delivering engaging, peer led, accessible film & new media workshops and screenings. SDSW epitomises the 'Nothing about us without us' mantra.

Audrey Mason-Hyde

Audrey has experience as an actor, spoken word poet and public speaker. Audrey has appeared in ABC series 'F**king Adelaide', feature film '52 Tuesdays' and short films 'Rapture', 'Elephantiasis' and 'A Field Guide to Being A 12-Year Old Girl'. In 2017 Audrey created a talk for TedX Adelaide about their experience of gender. Audrey was the 2018 Winner of Spoken Word SA's inaugural Youth Slam Rumble and has since been a consultant and speaker on Channel Nine's Cultural Conversations series - The Evolution of Gender.

Manal Younus

Manal Younus is a South Australian based storyteller from Eritrea who believes that language and stories make up the fabric of our existence. The young writer and performer frequently speaks and runs workshops on subjects including, culture, identity, youth leadership, female empowerment as well as creative writing and performance.

Jacinta Koolmatrie

Jacinta Koolmatrie is an Adnyamathanha and Ngarrindjeri person. She grew up in Port Augusta, moving to Adelaide to attend university where she obtained both Bachelor and Master's degrees in Archaeology. Her research has looked at how society has prioritised Western knowledges over Indigenous knowledges and how this has influenced people's perceptions of Indigenous cultures. Jacinta is currently working at the Migration Museum as a Curator of First Nations History and at the South Australian Museum as a collections assistant.
